# Bulldogs face Chiefland Aug. 16 in Kickoff Classic

Prior to the game, both teams agreed to eliminate kickoffs and punts, hoping to avoid unnecessary injuries, which they managed to accomplish, as neither team had a player go down.

NFC got the ball on their own 30-yard line to begin the game and managed to string together nine plays for 70 yards and scored on a short touchdown run to go ahead of the Bulldogs 7-0 early in the first quarter.

Of the Eagles' nine plays, only one was a pass, which went for 25 yards.

Glanton began the Bulldogs' first drive at QB with a 14-yard scramble for a first down. Two plays later, Glanton broke loose for 27 yards thanks to some good downfield blocking by receiver Demari' Stephens.

Three plays later McGrew scored on a 21-yard touchdown run to get the Bulldogs on the board with just over 3 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

A successful extra point kick by Irving Azerte – who

nailed five out of his six point after attempts (PATs) – tied the score at 7-7.

NFC picked up 17 yards on their first carry before the Bulldogs defense hunkered down for a few plays thanks to big stops from Jordan Tyler, Traven Barnes and Stephens.

On second and long, Taylor County gave up a 45-yard touchdown pass to fall behind 13-7 following an unsuccessful extra point attempt.

On the Bulldogs' next possession, McGrew moved the ball himself behind some solid offensive line play that cleared the way for runs of 23 and 37 yards to move the Bulldogs inside the Eagles' 10-yard line.

Glanton would pick up the remaining eight yards necessary for a touchdown to put the Bulldogs ahead 14-13 after Azerte nailed the extra point.

On the Eagles' first play back on offense, Ryan Thompson stuffed the runner for a six-yard loss, but NFC would pick up half the yardage necessary for a first down before breaking loose for 23 yards on third

down. Taylor's defense shut the Eagles down on the next four plays, led by Duffell, Sante Harris, Tahj Clark and Glanton.

The Bulldog offense returned to the field with Kadyn Puhl entering the game for his first series at quarterback.

McGrew broke loose for 19 yards on first down, which followed by a 7-yard pass completion from Puhl to Stephens.

After two short runs by McGrew, Puhl found Stephens again for a 10-yard completion, but Taylor was unable to pick up the first down.

With under six minutes left in the second quarter, NFC's offense returned to the field, but was shut down by the Bulldog defense.

Sparrow picked up a sack on first down, before the Bulldogs committed two unnecessary personal fouls penalties that helped keep the Eagle's offense on the field.

Casen Heartsfield stuffed the runner for a four-yard loss, which was followed up by two more stops by the Bulldogs defense to

allow TCHS to take a 14-13 lead into halftime.

Both coaches agreed to 10-minute quarters for the second half, with Taylor County getting the ball first to start the third quarter.

Glanton hooked up with Barnes for a 13-yard completion, before finding Stephens two plays later for a 30-yard completion down to the 23-yard line.

McGrew broke loose for his second touchdown run, scampering 23 yards to increase the Bulldogs lead to 21-13 following Azerte's successful PAT.

NFC's offense responded with a 10-play, 60 yard scoring drive that ate up over four minutes of the third quarter before scoring a touchdown and converting a two-point conversion to tie the game up 21-21.

McGrew started the Bulldogs' next drive by running for eight yards, followed by a 14-yard scamper by Glanton.

Puhl then came in at quarterback for the Bulldogs, but handed the ball off to McGrew, who picked up 17 yards.

Puhl then threw a perfect fade pass to Stephens for a 21-yard touchdown reception to give the Bulldogs a 27-21 lead after the PAT was blocked.

NFC started their next offensive possession with a screen pass that picked up 24 yards before being smothered by the Bulldogs defense inside the 10-yard line and turning the ball over on downs.

The Bulldogs offense returned to the field for the first time of the fourth quarter and ripped off a 60-yard run by McGrew.

On second down and long, Puhl found Stephens again, this time for a 26-yard completion down inside the Eagle's 10-yard line.

Barnes would pick up the remaining six yards on the ground for a touchdown to put the Bulldogs two possessions ahead 34-21 following a nice PAT kick from Azerte.

Javeion Harris made a big stop for the Bulldogs on first down, which was followed up with a 7-yard sack by Jacob Cash.

Kobe Flowers made another big stop for the

Bulldogs on third down, to bring Taylor's offense back onto the field.

The Bulldogs were stopped in three plays, as they simply tried to run time off the clock.

The game was all but over, but Sante Harris put an exclamation point on the win, as he returned an interception 75 yards for a touchdown with under two minutes left in the fourth quarter to increase the Bulldogs' lead to 41-21.

Taylor County will now begin preparing for the fall season, as they have a busy summer schedule ahead of them starting this Thursday with a 7 vs. 7 passing practice following school.

The Bulldogs' summer workouts are slated to begin June 4 at 10 a.m. and Taylor's first 7 vs. 7 tournament will be June 6.

The next time Taylor County will take the field will be August 16 in Chiefland for the Kickoff Classic.

Taylor's first regular season game will be August 23 when they host Dixie County beginning at 7:30 p.m.

mail a copy of the petition to the applicant at the address indicated above, at the time of filing. A petition for administrative hearing must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received) with the Agency Clerk in the Office of General Counsel, 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, MS 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000, Agency\_Clerk@dep.state.fl.us, before the deadline. The failure of any person to file a petition within the appropriate time period shall constitute a waiver of that person's right to request an administrative determination (hearing) under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S., or to intervene in this proceeding and participate as a party to it. Any subsequent intervention (in a proceeding initiated by another party) will be only at the approval of the presiding officer upon the filing of a motion in compliance with Rule 28-106.205, F.A.C.  
A petition that disputes the material facts on which the Permitting Authority's action is based must contain the following information: (a) The name and address of each

agency affected and each agency's file or identification number, if known; (b) The name, address, any email address, telephone number and any facsimile number of the petitioner; the name, address any email address, telephone number, and any facsimile number of the petitioner's representative, if any, which shall be the address for service purposes during the course of the proceeding; and an explanation of how the petitioner's substantial interests will be affected by the agency determination; (c) A statement of when and how each petitioner received notice of the agency action or proposed decision; (d) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so state; (e) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action; (f) A statement of the specific rules or statutes the petitioner contends require reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action including an explanation of how the alleged facts relate to the specific rules or statutes; and, (g)

A statement of the relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action the petitioner wishes the agency to take with respect to the agency's proposed action. A petition that does not dispute the material facts upon which the Permitting Authority's action is based shall state that no such facts are in dispute and otherwise shall contain the same information as set forth above, as required by Rule 28-106.301, F.A.C. Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the Permitting Authority's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this Public Notice of Intent to Issue Air Permit. Persons whose substantial interests will be affected by any such final decision of the Permitting Authority on the application have the right to petition to become a party to the proceeding, in accordance with the requirements set forth above.  
Extension of Time: Under Rule 62-110.106(4), F.A.C., a person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's action may also request an extension of time to file a petition for an administrative

hearing. The Department may, for good cause shown, grant the request for an extension of time. Requests for extension of time must be filed with the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000, or via electronic correspondence at Agency\_Clerk@dep.state.fl.us, before the deadline for filing a petition for an administrative hearing. A timely request for extension of time shall toll the running of the time period for filing a petition until the request is acted upon.  
Mediation: Mediation is not available in this proceeding.

**FINAL PUBLIC NOTICE**  
The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has received a subgrant application from Taylor County for repairs to a navigational beacon in the mouth of the Aucilla River due to damages from Hurricane Michael (DR-4399-FL). Pursuant to Executive Order 11988 and 44 CFR Part 9.12, final notice

is hereby given of FEMA's intent to provide funding for the above project under the Public Assistance (PA) Program.  
An initial disaster-wide Public Notice was published October 30, 2018 for Hurricane Michael. FEMA has determined that the only practicable alternative is to locate the navigational beacon at its original location within the floodplain; the facility is functionally dependent upon its location within the floodplain and promotes open space use.  
Funding for the proposed project will be conditional upon compliance with all applicable federal, tribal, state, and local laws, regulations, floodplain standards, permit requirements, and conditions. This action complies with the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) requirements.  
Location of the Proposed Work: River Entrance to Aucilla River (GPS: 30.08077, -83.99238)  
Proposed Work and Purpose: Taylor County intends to replace the beacon for navigational safety. Pilings will be embedded 10 feet into the substrate to secure the beacon and provide a ladder.

Project Alternatives:  
The no action alternative has been considered; this alternative is not feasible as the navigation beacon will remain vulnerable to flood risk. If no action is taken to place a navigational beacon at the mouth of the Aucilla River, its absence will affect the safety and efficiency of vessels within the vicinity. Alternate locations were not considered as navigational aids are functionally dependent upon their location within the floodplain.

This will serve as the final public notice regarding the above-described action funded by the FEMA PA Program.
