and provides natural opportunities to get up and move.

These small actions may seem insignificant, but over time they can add up to meaningful health benefits.

The key is consistency rather than intensity.

Every movement counts, and those small moments of activity throughout the day can contribute to improved health, increased energy and better physical function.

This month, challenge yourself to find opportunities to move more.

Whether it's taking a short walk, stretching between tasks or standing up more often, those small bursts of movement can lead to big benefits for your health.

Simple Ways to Add More Movement

- Take a 5-10 minute

walk after meals.

- Stand up and stretch every hour.
- Walk while talking on the phone.
- Park farther away from entrances.
- Use stairs when possible.
- Carry groceries in multiple trips.
- Perform chair sit-stands during television commercials.
- Stay hydrated and use water breaks as movement breaks.

Camp Whisk & Wonder Serves Up Fun, Learning and Lifelong Skills

Thirty youth spent four exciting days mixing, measuring, chopping, baking and exploring the world of food during Taylor County 4-H's Camp Whisk & Wonder Culinary Day Camp.

While campers certainly enjoyed tasting their creations, the camp offered much more than delicious food.

Participants gained valuable life skills, built confidence and learned lessons that will benefit them long after the camp ended.

The week began with the foundation of every successful kitchen -- safety.

Campers learned food safety practices, proper handwashing techniques and griddle safety before putting their new knowledge into action.

They prepared homemade pancakes, breakfast burritos and fruit parfaits while learning the importance of following directions, measuring ingredients accurately and working together as a team.

On the second day, campers got a behind-the-scenes look at the restaurant industry during a visit to the local Pizza Hut.

They learned how the restaurant operates, explored different job responsibilities and even created their own personal pan pizzas.

Back at camp, youth practiced knife safety and learned how to properly cut meats and vegetables while preparing ingredients for a stir-fry.

These activities helped campers develop responsibility, attention to detail and confidence in handling kitchen tools safely.

The adventure continued with a visit to a local blueberry farm, where campers experienced firsthand where food begins.

They picked fresh blueberries straight from the bushes and learned about the work involved in producing food.

After returning to camp, they washed and prepared their harvest to create blueberry trifles with homemade whipped cream and blueberry Greek yogurt muffins.

Through these activities, campers gained an appreciation for agriculture while learning how fresh ingredients can be transformed into healthy and delicious meals.

The final day took campers on a food tour in Thomasville, Ga., where they explored the creativity and craftsmanship behind local food businesses.

Participants learned the art of bagel making, sampled freshly baked bagels and enjoyed sourdough pizza made from a sourdough starter that has been maintained for more than 200 years.

They also toured a local chocolate shop, watched chocolate being made and sampled a fresh macaroon.

These experiences introduced youth to entrepreneurship, food science and the many career opportunities available within the food industry.

Throughout the week, campers developed skills that extend far beyond the kitchen.

They strengthened communication and teamwork while working in groups, practiced problem-solving as they followed recipes, and built self-confidence by mastering new tasks and trying unfamiliar foods.

Measuring ingredients reinforced math skills, reading recipes strengthened literacy skills and preparing meals encouraged independence and responsibility.

Camp Whisk & Wonder demonstrated that cooking is about much more than preparing food.

It is about learning to work with others, making healthy choices, developing practical life skills and gaining confidence in one's abilities.

Through hands-on experiences and real-world learning opportunities, UF/IFAS Extension Taylor County 4-H helped youth create memories, friendships and skills that can positively impact them for years to come.
